What inspires you?

Everything inspires me, even the most nonsensical things. Absurd elements can become an inspiration. Being out in the day is an inspiration. Walking through the streets, sitting in a restaurant, talking to people, doing my work, there is always something happening each time that is exciting. It all becomes part of me. The key idea for the stage design I did for the Sydney Dance Company came from music, well before the choreography was begun.

How would you describe your room? It is a fistful of haphazard arbitrary things simply selected and assembled just for kicks. It is formless and slightly chaotic. It's a kind of quick wish list – supermarket shopping cruising down the aisles – taking things that are available and making impulsive choices. It looks like fun.

Tell me about the pieces you picked The baseball mitt is such a whimsical piece of furniture, it is a visual joke and a great treat. That it is so comfortable makes it a 100% treasure. The Louis Ghost chair is a good tongue-in-cheek idea based on a French fauteuil en cabriolet transposed into the 21st century in terms of material. It is like an apparition or disembodied spirit appearing in space.

What's the best thing about it? Part of the impulsive selection, it is a kind of chop Suey interior.

What makes it a great place to relax? There's plenty of room for me and two dogs.

It's the perfect chair to sit and wait for a bus.
